Club Meeting

45 members came to this month's talk at the hall. It was given by Tony Boffin on the history of Nuffield Place, a National Trust property near Henley-on Thames. Tony is a long-term volunteer at the property, once the home of Lord and Lady Nuffield.

Tony explained that Lord Nuffield was born William Morris in 1877, one of seven children. He initially wanted to study medicine, but having to leave school at 15 put an end to that ambition.

He started his working life mending bicycles but after seeing Henry Ford's Model T Ford, he became fascinated with motor cars. He designed his first car, the Bullnosed Morris, in 1913. This was produced commercially and was extremely successful. There followed significant expansion after he acquired larger premises to enable him to mass-produce the cars he was designing. Lowering of prices as a result of greater efficiency of production, the motor car became available to a mass market. His last successful car was the Morris Minor.

In addition to building motor cars, the company produced over 700 iron lungs, which were used in the polio epidemic in the 40's and 50's. These were exported all over the world.

Shortly before he became ennobled in 1933, he purchased Nuffield Place. Tony explained that the house is much as Lord Nuffield left it after he died in 1963. Many of the family's possessions are still in place. It is, in fact, a time warp.



The four-acre gardens at the house were a particular favourite of Lady Nuffield who appointed herself 'gardener in chief'. Today, volunteers are restoring the gardens back to their original glory. They are helped in this task by referring to old photographs of the original garden accessed from the Morris family archive.

Lord Nuffield was probably the richest and most successful man of the twentieth century. He not only made a fortune, but gave a fortune away. He always retained an interest in medicine. The medical world was always on his mind. He endowed a scholarship to found the Oxford Medical School. He made substantial and frequent donations to Guy's Hospital.

In addition he provided funds for the establishment of Nuffield College, Oxford as well as establishing the Nuffield Foundation, which is still active today. A philanthropist in every sense of the word.

Topical Tip –November 2021

Essential checklist for November

- Clear leaves with a spring tine rake and compost them.
- Plant shrubs, evergreens and conifers.
- Protect tender plants from frost with fleece or plant jackets.
- Put out bird food.
- Prune roses back, ensuring you cut stems at an angle just above the bud point.
- Remove fallen leaves from around the base of any rose bushes which suffered from blackspot or rust this summer, to reduce the chance of reinfection next year.

And for your lawn

- Aerate your lawn now before winter sets in. Either use a lawn aerator or simply insert a garden fork at regular intervals and lean it back slightly to let air in.
- Continue to clear fallen leaves off the lawn to keep it healthy using a light rake.
- Set your lawn mower to a higher cut-height for winter and complete a last cut.
- Edge your lawn. This is easy to do in the winter months once beds are clear. Lawn edging creates a neat and tidy appearance and makes maintenance easier throughout the year.
